viding treatments, nospitals mus evolve beyond being mere treat-ment centres by embracing cut-ting-edge solutions such as artifi-cial intelligence (AI)-driven diag-nostics and personalised medi-

He added that it was necessary to shift the focus towards preven-tive care and overall well-being to help create a more sustainable healthcare system.

"This vision is not born from incremental improvements, it is born from necessity and innova-tion as Malaysia faces a turning point with 45% of the nation's

Health Minister Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad said it was too early to make decisions, as the matter needed scrutiny. "We will discuss this in the min-istry's post-cabinet meeting and consult with our legal advisers. "While it's premature for amendments, this issue is seri-ous.

amendments, this issue is serious.

"We will evaluate all aspects, including the potential need for legislative changes if necessary," he said after the launch of the Malaysia International Health-care Megatrends 2024 event here yesterday.

Dr Dzulkefly was responding to growing public concern that crimes committed by individuals with mental health issues could lead to inadequate justice for victims and their families, as offenders might be deemed mentally unfit for prosecution.

He said such cases were becom-

He said such cases were becoming more frequent.
Health director-general Datuk
Dr Muhammad Radzi Abu Hassan said there was a need to further examine these cases.
"There's no justification for using mental health as the proof in a case, it shouldn't be that way.
"We take mental health seriously and have guidelines in place for addressing it.
"A wrongdoing remains a wrongdoing," he said.
Recently, a female driver who crashed into two motorcycles resulting in the deaths of three students of Universiti Teknologi Mara Dungun campus, was alleged to be mentally unstable.
Terengganu Health Department director Datuk Dr Kasemani Embong said the woman had no record of mental health treatment.
